## **Update by the Numbers:**

## **Updates:**

21 yellow-legged hornet queens have been discovered and eradicated since January 2024. Between April 16 and April 30, 2024, no new embryo nests were found, however, the Department did receive several reports that turned out to be bald-faced hornet nests. We are grateful for the continued vigilance of residents in the Savannah area.

As a reminder, at this stage of the year, yellow-legged hornet embryo nests closely resemble bald-faced hornet nests in size and appearance, making them easy to confuse. We encourage Georgians to report any small nest you come across rather than attempting identification independently, particularly without the queen present. If you find a nest like the ones pictured below, we ask that you contact us via our <a href="YLH reporting form">YLH reporting form</a> or <a href="email">email</a> so that our experts can accurately identify the nest.




If you come across a nest, take a photo and report it using the online <u>YLH reporting form</u> or email <u>yellow.legged.hornet@agr.georgia.gov</u>. Remember, if you remove a YLH nest, it's crucial to ensure the queen has been eliminated to prevent her from establishing another nest elsewhere. If unsure about removing a nest, please contact GDA.
